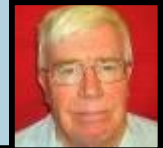

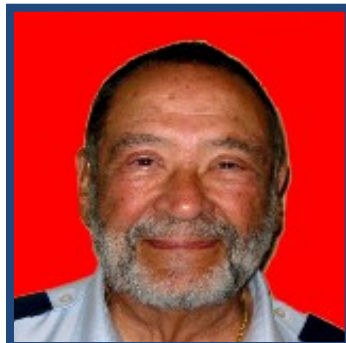

URGENT REMINDER

**Submitted by Ed Duda, CG-BSX
Flotilla 44**

ALL data entry to AuxData and AuxData Order Management (AOM) for the current period MUST occur prior to 5 April. At that time the current AuxData will be locked and no input of data will occur until the new AuxData is on-line, hopefully by 15 April. AOM entries must be approved by the Order Issuing Authority (OIA) in order to be inputted before the system is locked.

CDR Briggs has authorized the following procedure to be utilized during the shutdown time for the current AuxData to the new AuxData II:

Effective , 1 April, I will respond to any incoming tickets that require AuxData access with this “canned response” that has been created for this period:

Due to the upgrade of the current AuxData system to the new AuxData II, no Help Desk requests requiring AuxData action will be accepted by DIRAUX during the period following close of business 31 March 2020 through 15 April 2020. You may submit a new request for this member after 15 April.

I have already added this response to the “canned” responses in the Help Desk, so it is available to any staff to use if necessary. If the outage goes past 15 April I will simply edit the response to show the new date.

During the period between now and 5 APR please check to ensure that any Help Desk tickets assigned to you are responded to and tagged “Closed”. Please do not discard your existing AuxData User IDs and passwords yet; there is always the remote possibility that something might require us to resume using the existing AuxData if the unexpected happens. Once the new AuxData is up you will all receive new UIDs and passwords.

Any tickets coming in that do not require AuxData access (i.e.: Orders request, Qualification Examiner (QE) requests, etc.) I will continue to assign to the proper team member.

Once AuxData locks down on 6 April any unresolved tickets will be tagged RESOLVED so they will no longer appear in the queue. Any tickets that are resolved in this fashion will require a new Help Desk Ticket once AuxData II is available to us.

Thank you for your support during this transition.



So Who needs YPT (Youth Protection Training):



All Auxiliarists are strongly encouraged to thoroughly familiarize themselves with the AUXSCOUT program and successfully complete the BSA Youth Protection Training (YPT), background. However, Auxiliarists who have the potential to directly interact with any members of the BSA who are under 18 years of age on a regular basis shall:

- (a) Read and be thoroughly familiar with reference (a).
- (b) Read and be thoroughly familiar with this SOP.
- (c) Be current in AUXCT.
- (d) Successfully complete the BSA YPT and provide proof of such completion to the cognizant Flotilla Commander prior to such interaction. This training must be renewed every two years in order to remain authorized to engage in the AUXSCOUT program.

A regular basis is defined as the likelihood of direct interaction (e.g., face-to-face; via phone/email/text) with such BSA members more than once in each calendar year in the course of planning or conducting any Auxiliary activity. This threshold does not include public education or public affairs activities that are provided to the general public, nor does it include regular Auxiliary unit meetings. Successful BSA YPT completion and currency shall be recorded in AUXDATA.

(3) Auxiliarists who serve in the following elected and appointed offices in a flotilla or division that charters a Sea Scout Ship shall be current in AUXCT and shall successfully complete BSA YPT in advance of their assumption of office regardless of the degree of direct interaction (if already in office, then such training shall be successfully completed prior to formalization of the relationship):

- (a) Flotilla Commander (FC) and Flotilla Vice Commander (VFC).
- (b) Flotilla Staff Officer for Human Resources (FSO-HR).
- (c) Flotilla Staff Officer for Member Training (FSO-MT).
- (d) Flotilla Staff Officer for Operations (FSO-OP).
- (e) Division Commander (DCDR) and Division ViceCommander (VCDR).
- (f) Division Staff Officer for Human Resources (SO-HR).
- (g) Division Staff Officer for Member Training (SO-MT).
- (h) Division Staff Officer for Operations (SO-OP).

(4) Auxiliarists who serve in any other appointed offices in a flotilla or division that oversee program management in any other program area that is subject to engagement with Sea Scout youth pursuant to chartering a Sea Scout Ship shall be current in AUXCT and shall successfully complete BSA YPT in advance of their assumption of office regardless of the degree of direct interaction (if already in office, then such training must be successfully completed prior to formalization of the relationship). For example, if a flotilla that charters a Sea Scout Ship includes the vessel examination program as part of its engagement with Sea Scout youth, then the FSO-VE shall be current in AUXCT and shall successfully complete BSA YPT prior to engagement of Sea Scout youth in vessel examination program activities.

(5) Consistent with BSA Youth Protection Standards, the principles of two-deep leadership (i.e., at least two-person adult presence) and gender-specific requirements always apply to Auxiliarists when engaging face-to-face with any member of the BSA younger than 18 years of age, whether enrolled in the Auxiliary or not, and who is not a family member. Specifically:

- (a) No Auxiliarist shall ever put themselves in a one-on-one situation with such BSA youth members.
- (b) Every Auxiliarist is expected to prevent the possibility of singular presence and shall ensure that another adult is in their company whenever physically present with such BSA members.
- (c) If Sea Scout youth participating in or attending an Auxiliary activity are of both sexes, then two-deep leadership must also consist of at least one member of each sex. If the Sea Scout youth are of a single sex, then at least one of the two-deep leadership shall be of that sex.

Sunshine Skyway 10K Run

On Sunday morning March 1st, I ran in the third annual Sunshine Skyway 10k. This race benefits military families and has become the biggest run in the Tampa Bay area, with over 8,000 participants. Due to the popularity of this event, participation is now decided by a lottery system. Approximately 15,000 runners entered the lottery for the 8,000 spaces. I was able to run under Team Coast Guard and so I was awarded a spot.

I've only run 5ks in the past, so I was apprehensive about a 10k, particularly with a 425 foot incline (all of my 5ks have been in Florida, on flat terrain). I was not disappointed, this race was tough. I arrived at the race staging area at Tropicana Field at 05:30. Due to the huge number of runners, the race is broken down into four waves. I was wave three scheduled to start at 06:30. We were bused from Tropicana Field to the starting line at the south fishing pier of the bridge. Upon arrival, all I could think was WOW. Here were 2,000 runners, C-130 flyovers low and slow, Jayhawk HH-60 Helos "buzzing" the bridge. The starting gun was an Army Howitzer 105 mm cannon.

Loads of active duty personnel from all military branches (in uniform) lined the bridge. Team Coast Guard started the race, carrying the colors and running the entire 10k (6.2 miles). The starting gun for wave three sounded at 07:10 and off I went. Due to the amount of people starting at once and in two lanes, the first mile was tough. I was able to hit stride in miles two and three but then the incline started. It's four feet up for every 100 feet of pavement. I know this doesn't sound like much, but it's the hardest running I've ever done. Upon reaching the bridge summit, it leveled off and by mile five we were in downhill mode.

The finish at the North fishing pier was mobbed with military and race officials. What a rush. We were ushered back onto buses heading back to the Tropicana Field where we were given our finisher's medal. I was fortunate enough to be "medaled" by a wonderful race volunteer, my wife Sharon. That was the highlight of my morning. I was very pleased with my race time and the party back at Tropicana Field was outstanding. It was a real honor to run this race, particularly as Team Coast Guard.

Importance of Having a Personal Locator Beacon

On Saturday afternoon March 21, U. S. Coast Guard Station Sand Key responded to a Personal Locator Beacon (PLB) sending out a distress call approximately 12 nautical miles off Clearwater Pass. CG SSK crew on a 45-foot Response Boat along with the assistance of an Air Station Clearwater HC-130 Hercules aircrew located the vessel overturned with all members on top of the hull of a medium size boat. They recovered a man and a woman from a sinking vessel after activating a personal locator beacon. They were taken to Clearwater City Marina safely with no injuries or medical concerns.

“Having a personal location beacon made a big difference in this case”, said Senior Chief Petty Officer Angel Ramos, the command duty officer at Sector St. Petersburg. “Cell phones don’t always work offshore and these devices allow us to begin a search from a last known position”.

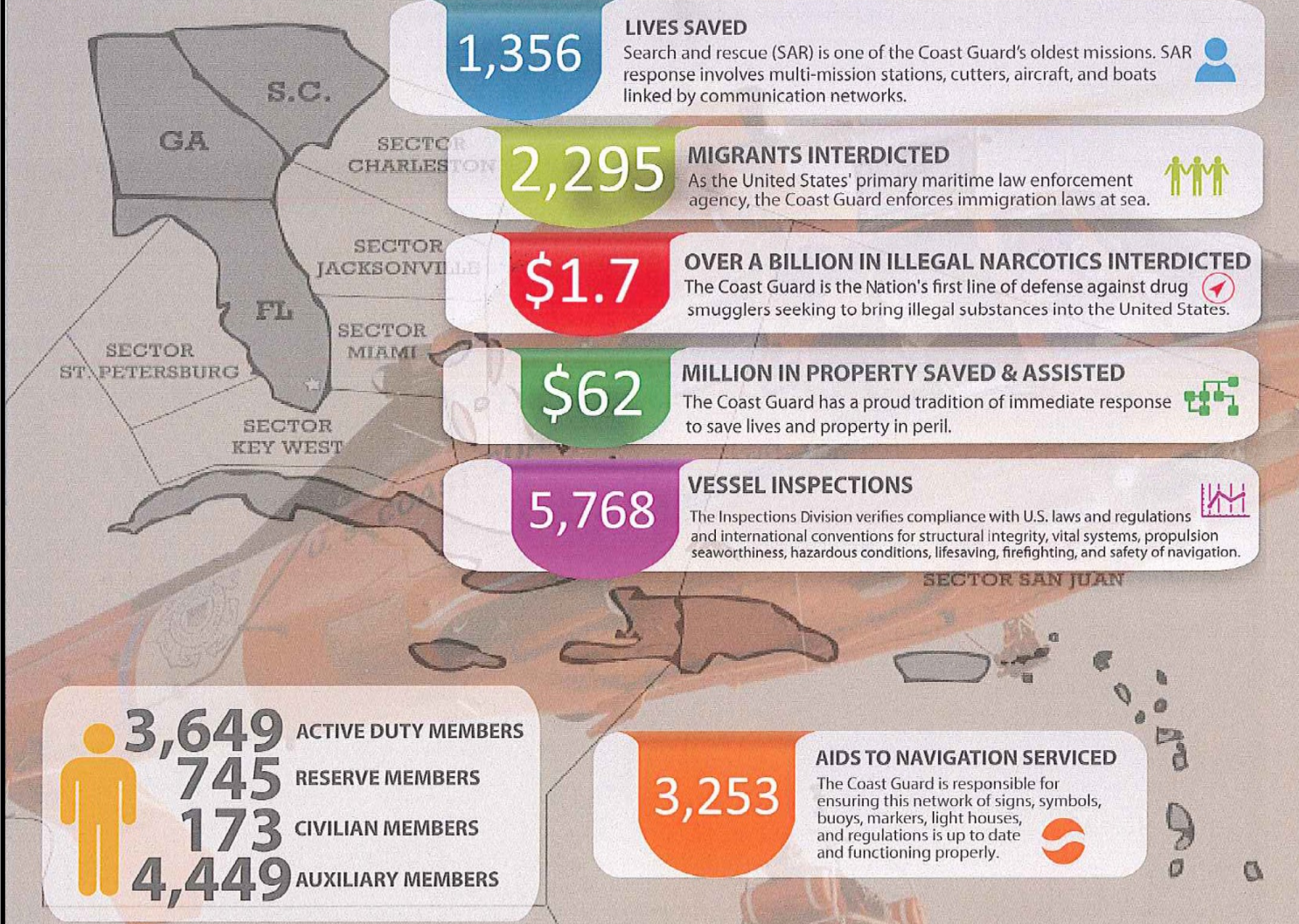

The U.S. Coast Guard is one of the five armed service branches of the United States and the only military organization within the Department of Homeland Security. The Coast Guard protects against hazards to people, maritime commerce and environment. It defends our maritime borders and saves those in peril. It responds quickly to disasters to restore the Nation's waterways. When called upon, the Coast Guard defends the nation at home and abroad alongside the other armed services.

The Seventh Coast Guard District is one of nine district offices nationwide and has responsibility for all Coast Guard operations in South Carolina, Georgia, the Florida Peninsula, Puerto Rico and the entire Caribbean basin, which includes the U.S. Virgin Islands and 32 other countries and territories. This encompasses an area of 1.8 million square miles and includes the largest concentration of cutters and aircraft in the Coast Guard. D7 handles one-quarter of all Coast Guard search and rescue cases and two-thirds of all law enforcement cases. D7 includes eight of the nation's largest container ports and the three largest multi-day cruise ports in the world: Port Miami; Port Everglades; Port Canaveral and three Space Ports.

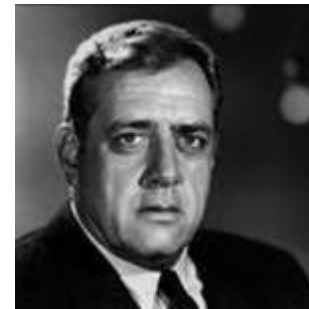
